Dear Colleagues and Friends,

Welcome to Warsaw, to our 2023 AIB Conference.

The theme for this year's conference proposed by our Program Chair, Kaz Asakawa: "International Business Resilience under Global Disruption," summarizes the global scenario we all live in. Topics include resilience to develop or maintain a new world order, to disinvest or invest in international operations, to deal with innovation, to cope with changes in consumer behavior, global value chain disruption, and issues regarding cyber security, among others.

The choice of location: Warsaw, Poland, is the most appropriate to shelter our discussions and reflections. You will have panels and sessions on the different themes attracting large audiences.

Paul Polman Former CEO, Unilever

Paul Polman works to accelerate action by business to tackle climate change and inequality. He believes, above all, that humanity will only overcome our greatest shared challenges through far-reaching systems change and bold new partnerships to deliver the UN Sustainable Development Goals, which he helped develop.

As CEO of Unilever (2009-2019), Paul demonstrated that business can profit through purpose, marrying a long-term, multi-stakeholder model with excellent financial performance. During Paul's tenure, shareholders saw their returns increase by 290% while the company consistently ranked 1st in the world for sustainability and as one of best places to work.

Today Paul works across a range of organizations and initiatives to help speed the global action needed to regenerate our planet, renew our economies and unite our societies. He helps business move further and faster on these ambitions, including through his work with <u>Systemia</u> and through mobilizing private equity.

He helps drive bold new coalitions within industries such as <u>fashion</u> and food, as well as between the private sector, government and civil society, including through his work leading the <u>UN Global Compact</u> and as an Ambassador for the <u>Race to Zero</u> and Race to Resilience.

Paul is also passionate about developing our next generation of leaders, which he does as chair of the Oxford University <u>Saïd Business School</u>, and through his work with <u>INSEAD</u>, <u>IESE</u> and the Boards of <u>PRME</u> and <u>One Young World</u>.

Last year Paul's published his <u>critically-acclaimed book</u> with sustainability expert Andrew Winston, <u>"Net Positive"</u>, which sets out how to build companies which succeed by fixing the world's problems, rather than creating them. He actively campaigns on a range of human rights issues, including promoting disability inclusion through the <u>Valuable 500</u> and the <u>Kilimanjaro</u> <u>Blind Trust</u>, which he set up with his wife Kim. AIB Fellows' International Educator of the Year Award

Award Presentation and Keynote: Session 1.3.1 – 7 July, 13:00-14:15, Aula Glówna (Main Auditorium)

Salvador Carmona IE University

Under the leadership of Salvador Carmona, the IE University and its Business School have been transformed into leading research and educational hubs not only within Spain but also globally, attracting international faculty (40% of the full-time



faculty is international, from 42 countries), and students (76% of bachelor-degree students are international, from 102 nationalities) and consistently climb upwards within various rankings.

The IE University is representative of a relatively new cohort of non-state owned universities and business schools such as Bocconi and LUISS in Italy, among others. The university aims to "break the mold" of the traditional ways of learning in Spain and elsewhere by introducing highly innovative learning practices. The IE has been very successful in securing its economic sustainability and independence while providing an internationally recognized base for research and education. To a significant degree this success has been based on the IE's innovative leadership team led by Salvador Carmona, and in particular his efforts to connect other disciplines, such as management control, accounting and finance, with international business.

As a Professor of Accounting and Management Control, Professor Carmona is using business history as a heuristic lens to explore some of the best ideas in business organization and strategy that originated centuries ago. Using Spain's extensive archives he has been tracing the history of global companies like the Royal Tobacco Factory of Seville, what he believes is an early form of just-in-time production. This company is also one of the first global enterprises whose products have been traded within Spain, Europe, and Spanish dominions in the New World. Professor Carmona has also adopted a critical historical perspective to examine the role of accounting in international relations and trade by focusing on the Asiento, the treaty that granted Britain the monopoly to trade slaves with the Spanish American colonies from 1713 to 1743.

In addition to teaching and research, Prof. Carmona engages in consultancy work for corporations as well as conducting executive training and in-company programs aimed at the top-level management of multinational enterprises. Salvador is a true champion of interdisciplinary research; as an example, he co-edited a special issue of *Accounting and Business Review* aimed at integration of international business with contemporary accounting and finance.

Professor Carmona obtained both BSc and PhD in Economics and Business Administration at the University of Seville, Spain, and a CPCL from Harvard University. Before joining the IE University in 2002, he held prominent positions in other leading Spanish Universities, including Dean of the School of Social and Legal Sciences at the Universidad Carlos III (Madrid), and Professor and Chairman of the Department of Accounting at the Universidad de Sevilla.

AIB Fellows' Eminent Scholar Award

Franklin Allen Imperial College London

Franklin Allen is Professor of Finance and Economics and Executive Director of the Brevan Howard Centre at Imperial College London, UK. Previously, he was a chaired professor at the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania and was Co-Director of the Wharton Financial Institutions Center.

Dr. Allen is globally famous for his work in corporate finance, financial intermediaries and institutions, and finance for development. Within this umbrella, his work also spans financial innovation, financial inclusion, banking and financial crises, and corporate governance in emerging economies. His studies in comparative financial systems and development include the US, Europe, China, India, and Sub-Saharan Africa. Allen's wide-ranging contributions have appeared in the premier journals of both finance and economics (*JPE*, *JET*, *JIT*). At the time of this announcement, his works have a Google Scholar citation count of 90,828.

Franklin Allen has received numerous recognitions for his impact on the profession. He was Executive Editor of the *Review of Financial Studies* and Managing Editor of the *Review of Finance*. He is a past president of the American Finance Association, the Western Finance Association, and the Financial Management Association. He is a Fellow of the Econometric Society.

Alan M. Rugman Young Scholar Award

Formerly known as the Haynes Prize, the award was renamed in 2015 to acknowledge not just the impact that Alan Rugman has had on our field but his commitment to the engagement and development of junior scholars. Although moderation analysis is widely used in IB research and while both authors and reviewers generally favor the specification of (often complex) moderating relationships, the potential downsides of the resulting models are rarely considered. This round-table discussion seeks to explore the "dark side" of complex moderator models in terms of replicability and generalizability, and encourage a more balanced perspective on moderation analysis in empirical research.
