To conclude, I thank the organizing committee and sponsoring organizations for their hard work in making this conference possible. I extend a warm welcome to our distinguished keynote speakers, panelists, and participants. I hope our conference sparks meaningful discussions and a fruitful exchange of ideas. I hope it brings you new insights on the opportunities and challenges of our world's competitive digital globalization in a post-pandemic world.

## **Letter from the Program Chair**

### Dear Colleagues,

A warm welcome to Seoul and to the 66th annual meeting of the Academy of International Business (AIB). This is a special conference in many ways, not least because it is the first time that the AIB meeting has been able to return to the region since the Nagoya conference in 2011.

The AIB annual meeting has been held in Seoul once before, in 1995. South Korea is a very different place today to what it was thirty years ago, and one of the attractions of this conference will be the chance for us all to gain insight into the remarkable transformation that our host country and city has achieved.

As an organization, the Academy of International Business has also experienced considerable change over the past 30 years. When the AIB conference was held in Seoul in 1995, there were 380 participants listed in the program. At the time of writing there are 1414 people registered for this year's Seoul meeting. The conference attracted 1641 submissions, the highest number ever – a testament to the attractiveness of Korea and the strength of the AIB as an association. The program comprises 920 competitive and interactive papers and panel sessions. One feature of this year's conference is that Sustainability in International Business is the third largest track – another sign of the changes we are living through.

Putting together a conference of this size took the effort of an entire program team. Twenty-seven track chairs had to work to MEET demanding deadlines, and to make difficult decisions about acceptances and rejections. I especially wish to acknowledge the hard work of Gillian Bond, the PhD student from Trinity Business School who has been the program assistant for the conference. For the past 6 months she has been answering many of your emails and wrestling with the intricacies of IT systems to make the program a reality. I am very grateful to Laurent Muzellec, the Dean of Trinity Business School, for funding her position and supporting the conference in this tangible way.

Our sincere thanks are also due to Geon-Cheol Shin from Kyung Hee University, who has devoted so much of his time and energy to making the conference a reality. This has included inviting an array of senior business executives from the Korean business community to explain how they have been able to internationalize so successfully. An understanding of the 'Korean Wave' would not be complete without hearing about the role of government, so we are fortunate to have Byung Nae Yang, Deputy Minister for Trade, also joining us on 4 July.

Holding the conference would not be possible without the commitment and professionalism of the AIB Secretariat, under the leadership of Executive Director Tunga Kiyak. If you meet Tunga, Ieva, Anne, Dan, Kat and Bernice during the course of the conference, please do take the opportunity to thank them in person. As IB scholars, we all understand the difficulties of servicing a global client base (i.e., AIB members) and managing the complexities of an international project from a distance (i.e., a major event in a foreign location). Their experiential knowledge of how to do this, accumulated over many years, is definitely a rare, valuable and inimitable resource that we should all appreciate.

A highlight of the AIB annual meeting is the pre-conference program, which has been skillfully managed by Sri Zaheer. This year, during the pre-conference, participants in the doctoral and junior faculty consortia, as well as in



the JIBS and JIBP paper development workshops, are invited to a special session on the Ethics of Research, as well as to a workshop on the Craft of Reviewing featuring editors of IB journals and winners of best reviewer awards. Also, the recently formed Digitalization Special Interest Group (SIG) is offering a roundtable on Digital Africa for the first time. During the pre-conference, there will also be workshops from other SIGs on Teaching and Education, Research Methods, and Sustainability, as well as from WAIB on EDI research.

Of course, the program team also extends to everyone who reviewed for the conference and who will be taking on the role of session chairs during the conference. Many thanks to everyone who has contributed by denoting their time and expertise in these ways: the AIB depends on your willingness to do so. In particular, I wish to congratulate everyone who has received a Best Reviewer Award. We hope that the constructive and helpful tone that these reviewers have set will continue throughout the conference.

Led by Tamer Cavusgil (Dean) and Andrew Delios (Deputy Dean), AIB Fellows are an important part of conference preparation. Among other tasks, the Fellows give out three major awards: International Executive of the Year: Mr. Park Hyeon-Joo of Mirae Asset; International Educator of the year: Frank Bournois; and John Fayerweather Eminent Scholar of the Year: Edward Freeman. You will have the opportunity to hear from these distinguished award winners during the conference, and we are grateful for their willingness to join us.

For those of you for whom this is your first AIB conference – and maybe even your first international conference – I wish to extend a special welcome. First-time attendance at a conference of this size can be a daunting experience, as I vividly recall. We have incorporated many opportunities for you to be able to get to know other AIB members. These include a variety of social activities, starting with the New Members' Welcome Event on 3 July. You should also sample some of the cafes and clinics, and get involved in the activities of the Shared Interest Groups (SIGs). The connections you make in these informal and small group settings are ones that tend to endure beyond the conference, and are the beginning of a supportive global network.

There are too many highlights of the many panels and paper sessions in the program for me to mention. I will, though, take the opportunity to single out the special conference track on Dynamics, change and processes in international business. This conference is a timely opportunity for us to consider how IB scholarship itself needs to change in order to explain the momentous shifts in the global business environment we are currently witnessing. The co-chairs for the conference track, Ziad Elsahn and Jisun Yu, have provided us with an overview of how the papers and panels in this track show us the way forward.

I hope you will find the AIB 2024 meeting to be a rewarding experience, and that you will continue to be part of the AIB community for many years to come. In an increasingly fractured and divided world, it has been a privilege to help bring together a community of scholars from over 50 countries to discuss topics related to global connectedness and interdependence.

### **Letter from Conference Track Chairs**

## Dear colleagues,

We are excited to chair the conference track – Dynamics, Change and Processes in International Business – at AIB 2024 in Seoul. As we all know, the world economy is experiencing unanticipated disruptions. The frequency and pace of changes in the global environment are at an unprecedented level and greatly influence the way firms are engaging in cross-border activities. Making sense of such contextual changes requires IB researchers to adopt research approaches suitable to theorizing dynamics and processes. However, the methodological difficulties involved in collecting and analysing longitudinal data as well as the dominant paradigmatic assumptions that portray dynamic processes as a special topic, rather than natural, everyday, features of the world, have created substantial challenges in advancing knowledge. Against this backdrop, we called for more research embracing dynamic processes as a central theme. IB researchers have responded to this call, and we received an exceptionally high number of submissions. We observed three key themes underlying these submissions as follows.

First, several submissions *problematize and rethink central concepts in IB theories* by adopting different paradigmatic assumptions. For example, in a panel discussion chaired by Eleanor Westney, panellists will give an interactive discussion on how IB scholars might gain insights from focusing on understanding change and stability at the industry level, rather than seeing industry primarily as a control variable in firm-level studies. By conducting a problematization review, Plakoyiannaki and colleagues (submission 747) uncover the dominant onto-epistemological assumptions that underpin conceptualisations of space in the IB literature, and call for "viewing space as a social product that simultaneously combines geography and history." Continuing with the theme of space, Ritvala and colleagues (submission 876) bring attention to the materiality of space. By studying the physical HQ buildings, they show how these buildings "are like storytellers" that shape an MNE's identity and visions of the future.

Second, several studies *infuse dynamism in extant theories and/or take processual approaches to traditional IB topics*. For example, Celo (submission 442) reconceptualises the MNE as a complex adaptive system, while Lagerström and colleagues (submission 1313) take a dialectical perspective to theorize the unfolding of the subsidiary initiative process.

Finally, several papers *unveil the unfolding of IB phenomena over time* by conducting longitudinal studies particularly with historical approaches. For example, Sammartino and colleagues (submission 1040) explore de-globalization in Australia during the period 1914-1979, showing the resilience of MNEs in the face of deglobalization. Teresa Da Silva Lopes and co-panellists will discuss how historical perspectives can contribute to understanding current geo-political fragmentation and provide theoretical and practical implications for IB research.

We have many more sessions that should stimulate our understanding of dynamics and processes pertinent to IB research. We hope that you participate in these sessions and share your insights and expertise.

## Park Hyeon-Joo Founder, Mirae Asset Financial Group

Park Hyeon-Joo is the Founder and Global Strategy Officer (GSO) of Mirae Asset Financial Group, which successfully introduced disruptive innovation in the financial market at home and abroad since the foundation of the Group.

Founding Mirae Asset Global Investments and Mirae Asset Capital in 1997 and Mirae Asset Securities and Mirae Asset Venture Investment in 1999, Mr. Park's Mirae Asset has become a leading independent financial conglomerate in Korea. He was the first to introduce the concept of the mutual fund, real estate fund, and private equity fund into the Korean financial market, drastically transforming its market through innovations.

Mr. Park was appointed GSO of Mirae Asset Financial Group and stepped down as Chairman of Mirae Asset Securities on May 23, 2018, embarking on a mission to grow and evolve Mirae Asset's global business. His transition to GSO ushered in an institutionalized management model, the engine of the Group's success on the global stage. As part of his aspiration, Mirae Asset Global Investments acquired Horizon ETF in 2011 and Global X, a global leading thematic exchange-traded fund provider, in 2018.

Mr. Park's leadership and entrepreneurial spirit have driven the global rise of Mirae Asset, where he has spearheaded continuous change as a permanent innovator. Celebrating its 20th anniversary of international expansion since its inception in Hong Kong in 2003, Mirae Asset currently boasts a formidable global network spanning 18 regions worldwide.

Mr. Park emphasizes corporate social responsibility as one of the core values of Mirae Asset, which involves social giving-back to communities. He founded the Mirae Asset Park Hyeon Joo Foundation with his wealth in 2000, pledging to donate all his dividend income to the Foundation. The Foundation primarily focuses on providing scholarships to underprivileged students and funding other outreach educational programs in Korea, India, and Vietnam.

The triumphant story of Mirae Asset Financial Group, led by Mr. Park, has been introduced in the Case Centre and the Harvard Business School Cases.

Mr. Park holds a Bachelor of Administration degree from Korea University and participated in the Advanced Management Program at Harvard Business School.

## Frank Bournois

**CEIBS China Europe International Business School** 

Under his leadership as Executive President and Dean (from 2013 to March 2023), Professor Frank Bournois has led ESCP to become one of the world's most international business schools with very deep European roots. The school substantially improved its position in the international rankings.

Professor Bournois put in place an audacious European 'Brand and Size' strategy:


The oldest business in the world (created in Paris in 1819) school expanded to 7 campuses in Paris, Berlin, Madrid, Turin, London, Warsaw (started in 2015), and Dubai (started in 2022). Thanks to a well-established brand, the school started an innovative there-year Bachelor of Science in Management in which students must study each of their three years of study in a different country. The program is multidisciplinary including ABCDE modules (Arts, Business, Culture, Diplomacy, Engineering). It includes international business-related coursework including courses in strategy and international management, intercultural skills, international relations, European history, international economics, and comparative political systems. In addition, students must study a foreign language as part of the program. It also has compulsory internships and/or social impact projects and/or an apprenticeship. The school uses a similar pedagogical design for its other programs.

In April, 2023 Frank Bournois became Dean of China Europe International Business School with its key campuses in China, Ghana and Switzerland. He fully endorses the school's 'China depth and global breath' slogan. Amongst his early contributions to CEIBS was to strengthen the school's international modules in providing executive education participants with a more European perspective.

Prof. Bournois holds a Ph.D. in European Business Strategy from the University of Lyon (France), an MBA from Aston University (UK), and a DSc from City University of London (UK). He specializes in corporate governance and the study of how large European firms identify and grow their future international leaders. He is the author or co-author of 20 books, including The Handbook of Top Management Teams (Palgrave, 2010).

## **Edward Freeman**

**University of Virginia** 

Dr. Edward Freeman is the University Professor and Olsson Professor of Business Administration, and an academic director of the Institute for Business in Society at the Darden School of Business, University of Virginia.

Renowned for his influential contributions to stakeholder theory and business ethics, Dr. Freeman is best known for his award-winning book Strategic Management: A Stakeholder Approach (Cambridge, 2010), originally published in 1984. His remarkable academic output includes editorship or authorship of over 100 volumes and 200 articles, and a Google Scholar Citation count of over 138,000 as of November 2023. With a career spanning several decades, Dr. Freeman has significantly shaped contemporary management thinking by highlighting the pivotal role that diverse stakeholders play in organizational decision-making. His impact on the international business literature is profound, fostering a holistic view of business transcending borders and cultures and promoting a more sustainable and responsible approach to international business.

The science of social science develops and improves over time. But how much of social science is science, in the strictest sense of the definition of science? This question is not a new one, but it is an important one for understanding what skills we need to develop as social scientists involved in research on organizations. The importance of theory building makes qualitative research undeniable in today's rich, open and complex international environment. Recently, an explosion of new international business phenomena in emerging markets increases the pressure of building theories and provides attractive research sites for qualitative scholars. Yet, existing literature on the trustworthiness of qualitative methods in international business follow western methodological convention, which originates from developed economies and is not easy to capture contextual richness of emerging markets. This masterclass targets early career scholars and PhD students. It firstly reviews two traditional philosophical paradigms of qualitative research: qualitative positivism, and naturalist paradigm. After that, it explores the context of emerging markets and identifies action risks in establishing trustworthiness of qualitative methods in emerging markets. Finally, after discussions and brainstorming, it suggests approaches and procedures on contextualization and theorization in overcoming action risks.

A recent JIBS editorial defined [societal] impact as "potential effects outside academia, for example, on communities, economies, environments, and other actors." Building on this idea and utilizing the diverse AIB community, the session will explore social and environment sustainability impact in the IB context along three lines. First, we would like to discuss different institutional set-ups to capture sustainability impact across different countries and understand how this translates into IB research. Second, the discussion of impact in IB is often limited to firms and policy makers, overlooking potential effects on communities, health, the environment, quality of life, etc. We would like to brainstorm with participants how our scope of sustainability impact pathways can be broadened. Finally, the session is a platform to explore if the impact achieved in one research project could be transferable to other contexts/countries. This may be a start of future research projects and collaborations and achieving greater societal impact than originally anticipated. Novices and experts on sustainability and impact are welcome!
